# Reg.32(2)(c), PCR 2015

- "Negotiated procedure without prior publication" may be used:
  - "insofar as is strictly necessary where, for reasons of extreme urgency brought about by events unforeseeable by the contracting authority, the time limits for the open or restricted procedures or competitive procedures with negotiation cannot be complied with."



# Exceptional urgency

- Genuine reasons for extreme urgency
- Impossible to comply with the usual timescales
- Consequences of the situation are so novel as to be unpredictable

Situation not attributable to the contracting authority



# Dyson ventilators

 Was the need for additional ventilators predictable?

Was the urgency of government's own doing?

Was it "strictly necessary"?

- Coronavirus within Reg.32(2)(c)
- Work your way up the scale
- Urgency not limited to public health
- No minimum standards
- Phased approach
- Benefit of hindsight
- Evidence your reasoning
- Return to normality
